Eddie Murphy is someone I really want to like. Fortunately, he keeps allowing me to do so with his movies. I was pretty sure that anything worth seeing in this movie was in the previews. What Happens...

What I think about...

The actors.

Dave's crew has a great cast. The main characters on the ship are Murphy, a power hungry Ed Helms as no. 2, a goo-goo eyed Gabrielle Union as the cultural officer, and a true to his scary movie background Kevin Hart playing what I can only assume is a taste bud of Dave's who falls in love with hip-hop. Outside of Dave we have Banks who is a potential love interest for Dave. She was good but not great. I think many others could have played it better. Austyn Myers wasn't very convincing and he mostly overacts. My favorite was Scott Caan (of the Ocean's ensemble and son of actor James Caan) playing a cop that picks up on Dave's little secret and attempts to discover what Dave wants on the planet Earth.

The directing.

Honestly this is one of those where the director didn't make or break the movie. I felt the actors were the shining star (a dim one but shining) of this film. Yet, I can see how a bad director would have ruined this movie so the directing is adequate but not stand out.

What the critics said.

I actually agreed with most of the critics on this one. However, there were a few I have to dispute-- after all that's why you read these reviews. MSNBC said "It's a pity someone can't guide the course of Starship Murphy to a smarter, funnier universe than the one he's chosen to explore."
